
Building on the partnership with Kick It Out





IN MEMORIAM—MIRANDA 'MIZZIE' ASHITEY

Miranda, or Mizzie as many of us knew her, was a long-time Proud Lilywhites member and a proud Spurs fan.

She was one of those rare people who just made everything feel a bit easier. She had a quiet way of showing up for people, no fuss, no drama, just genuine care and kindness. She noticed when someone was struggling, listened without judgment, and found ways to make you laugh when you needed it most.

Even in the toughest times, Miranda stayed true to herself. Through years of treatment and the hardest final months, she never stopped worrying about everyone else or trying to protect the people she loved.

She was woven into so many lives as a friend, a supporter, and a constant. Losing her feels like the world has shifted off balance.

Typical Spurs, she made sure her final wishes included the Club she loved. Part of her will always be at the Lane, where she felt at home.

Miranda was loved deeply and will be missed just as much. We'll carry her with us, in how we look after each other, in how we show up, and in every memory of the good times shared.

IN MEMORIAM—VINCE GILLESPIE

The Proud Lilywhites are very sad to hear of the passing of Vince Gillespie after a short illness. He was 76 and began supporting Spurs when his family moved to Tottenham at the age of 8.

His father took him to his first match at the Lane when Bill Nicholson had just taken over as manager in 1958. Vince was an out gay man when it was illegal to be gay. His whole life was spent confronting homophobia and challenging others to share his vision of a more equal and just society. In 1978 he was one of five activists arrested by the police after demonstrating against a National Front March in Tottenham. These were the days when fascists would openly picket home games selling their racist propaganda.

In 1986 Vince became a Councillor for Bruce Grove on Haringey Council and became Chair of the Lesbian and Gay Committee. He pioneered Positive Images in the Council libraries and schools leading to a vicious, violent backlash. He soon became the target of physical and verbal abuse. Yet he never gave in or give up.

In 1989 along with his sister, he established Regard, the first national organisation for disabled LGBT people. He would become a disability advocate for a local charity and regularly advised the organisers of London Pride on access and inclusion issues.

In 1991 he joined the Gay Football Supporters Network and became one of the Spurs contingent, who regularly went to matches together for the next 30 years.

He leaves three nephews, James, Taischa and Dan Gillespie-Sells, the lead singer of The Feeling. With thanks to Darryl for this obituary

Over 70 people have signed up as new members this season, increasing our membership and allowing us to continue building a safe space for LGBTQI+ Tottenham fans
